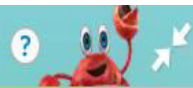


# What Can You Do with a Paleta?

by Carmen Tafolla illustrated by Magaly Morales

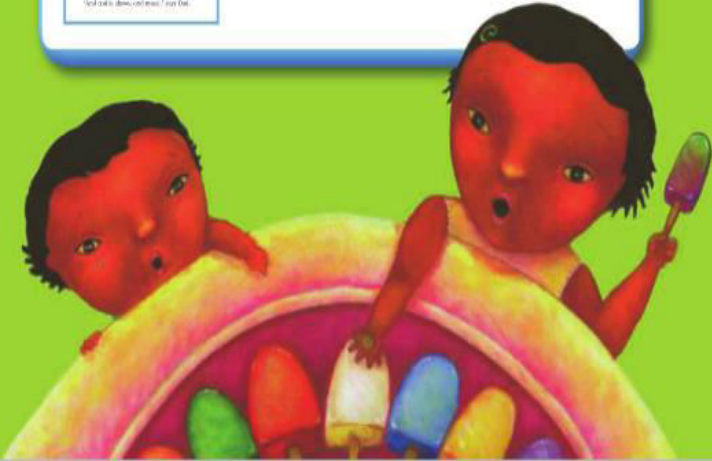


### Modeling Concepts of Print

- Have children point to the title and the name of the author on the cover and read them as you track the print. Track the print from left to right and top to bottom as you read each page.
- Tell children that when we get to the end of a line we move our finger down and to the left to start reading the next line. Using your finger, model this for children and have them practice the return sweep.
- When you read the question on page 9, model tracking the print. Then have children try tracking the print, using their finger, as they echo-read the question.

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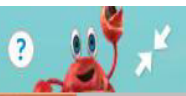

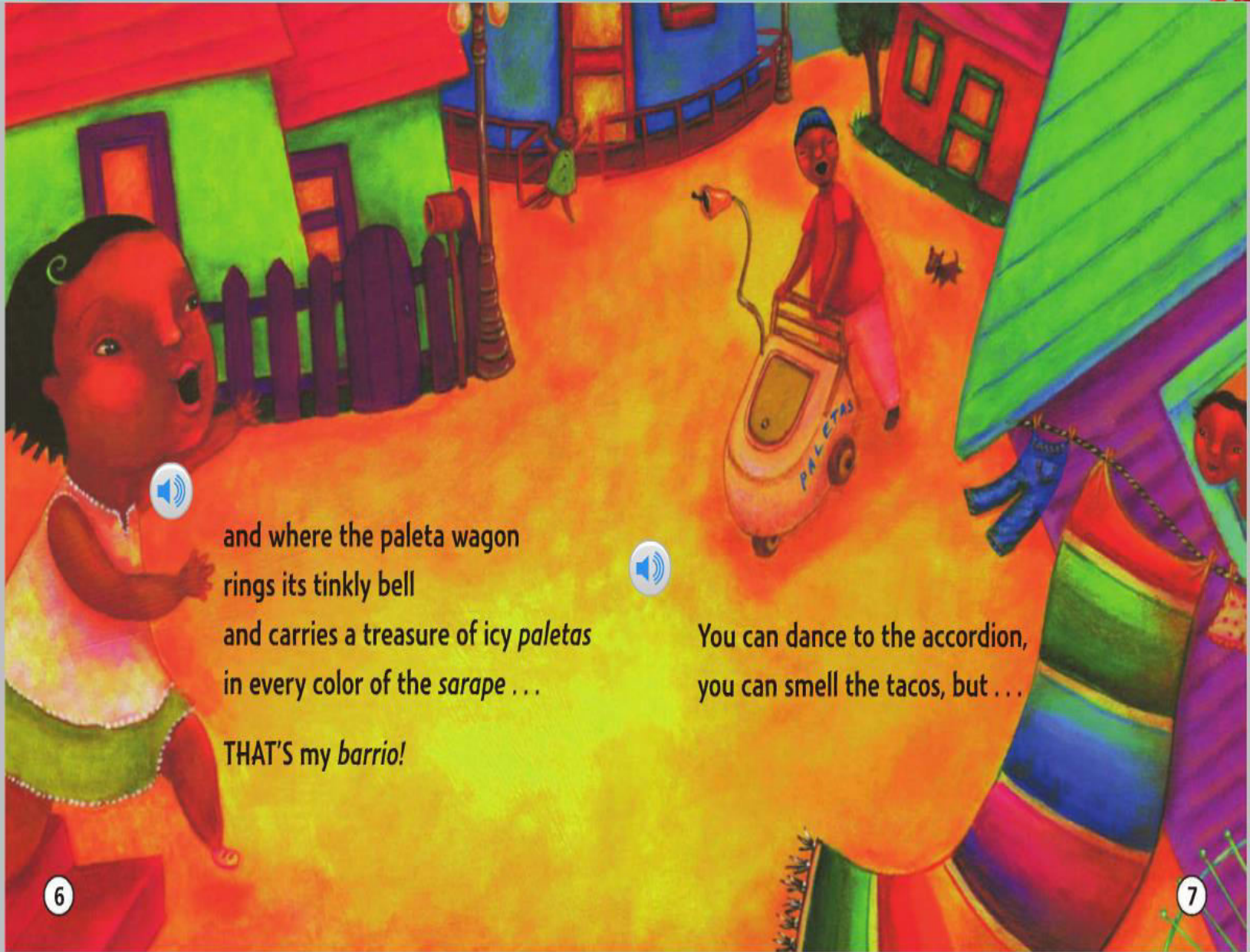
Where the big velvet roses bloom

floats out of every window,







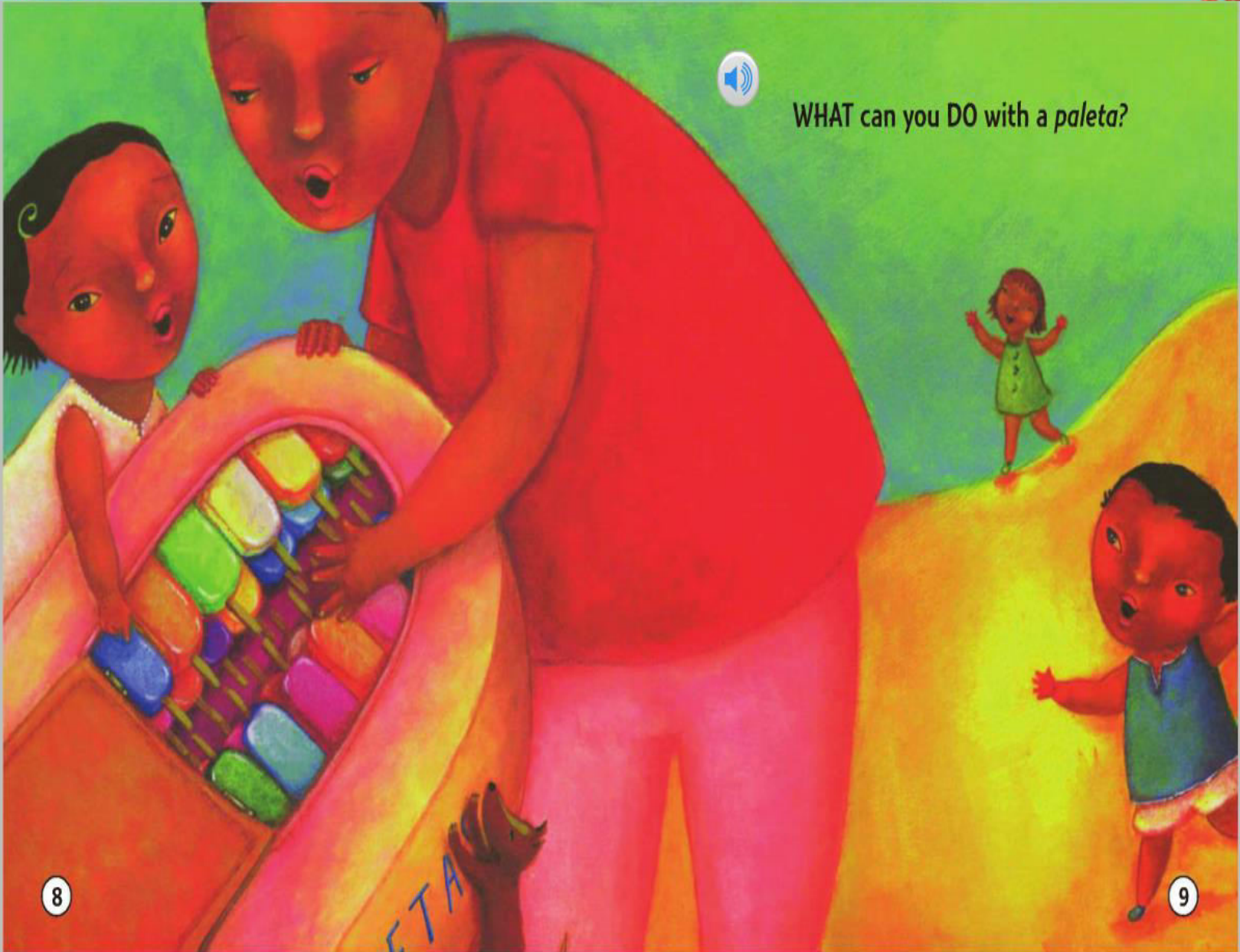
and where the paleta wagon

you can smell the tacos, but . . .



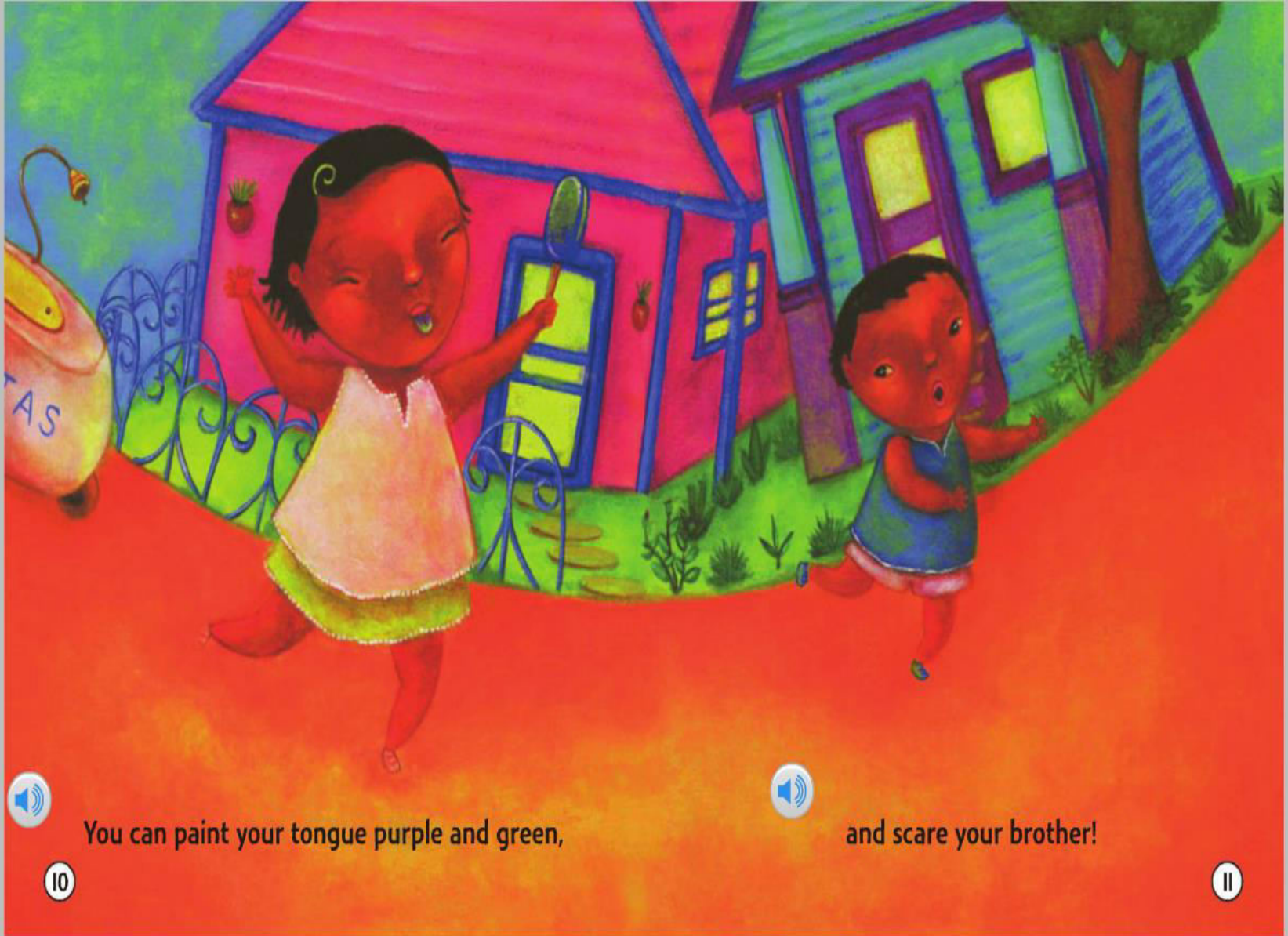

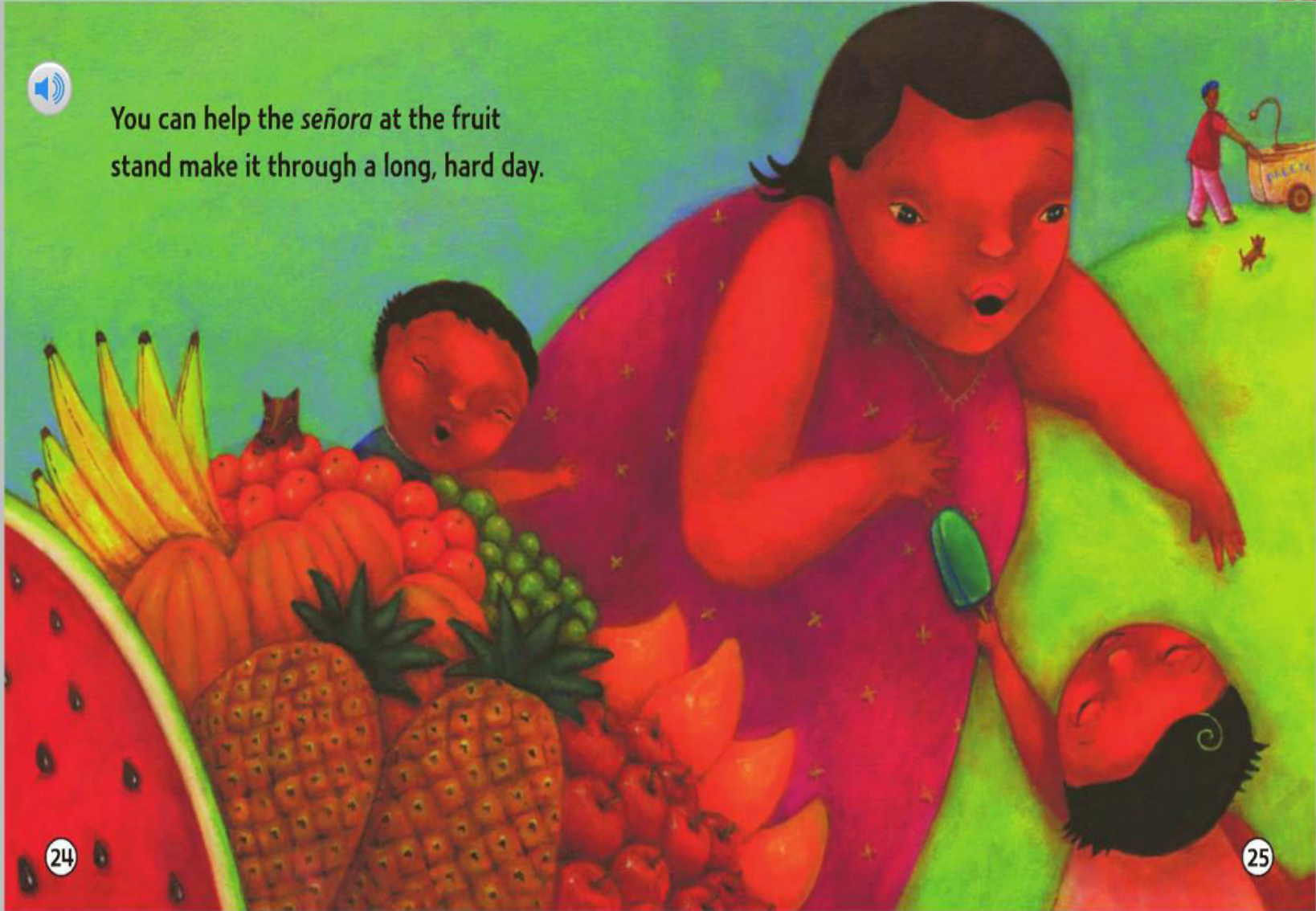




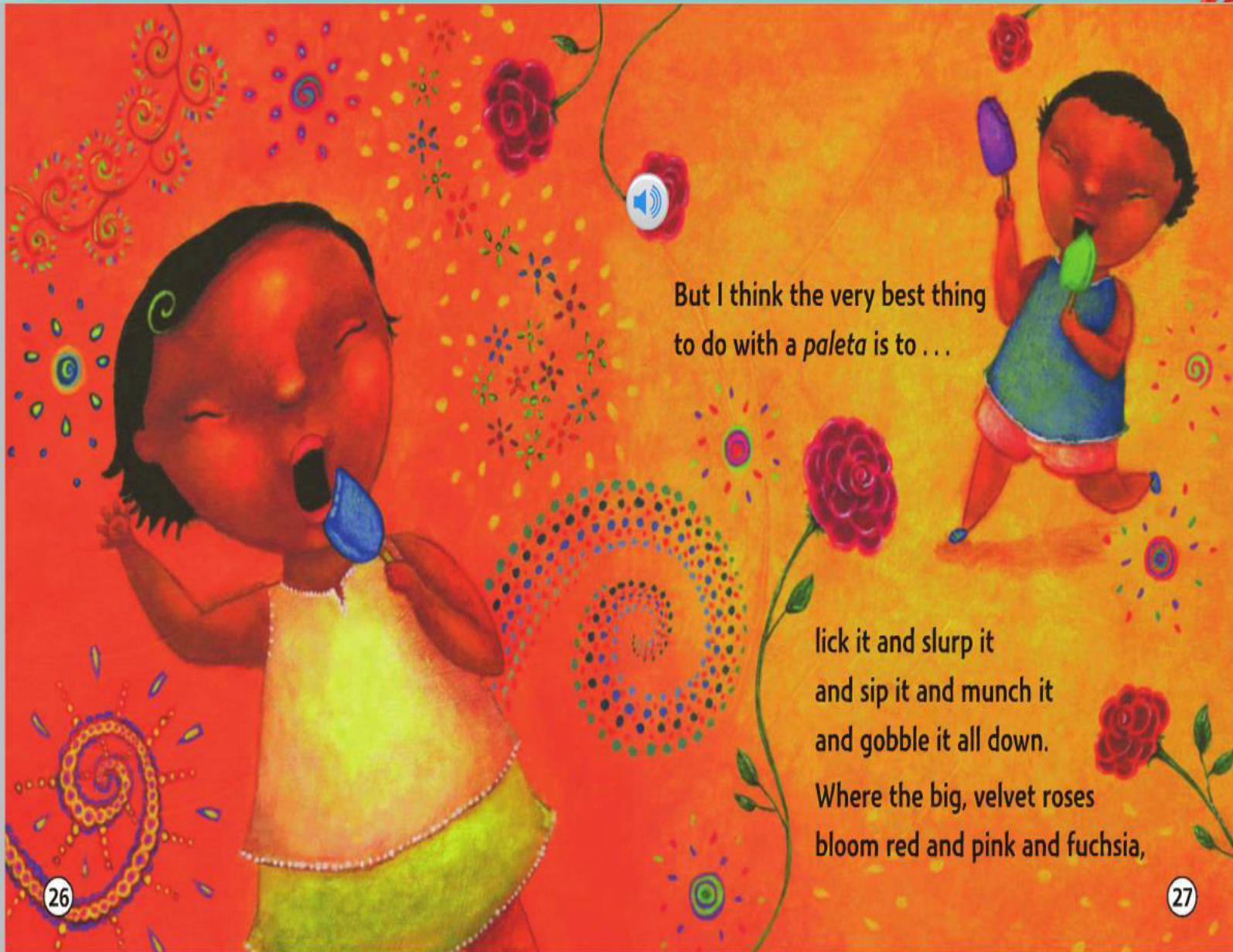
Tío once won a baseball game

bloom red and pink and fuchsia,





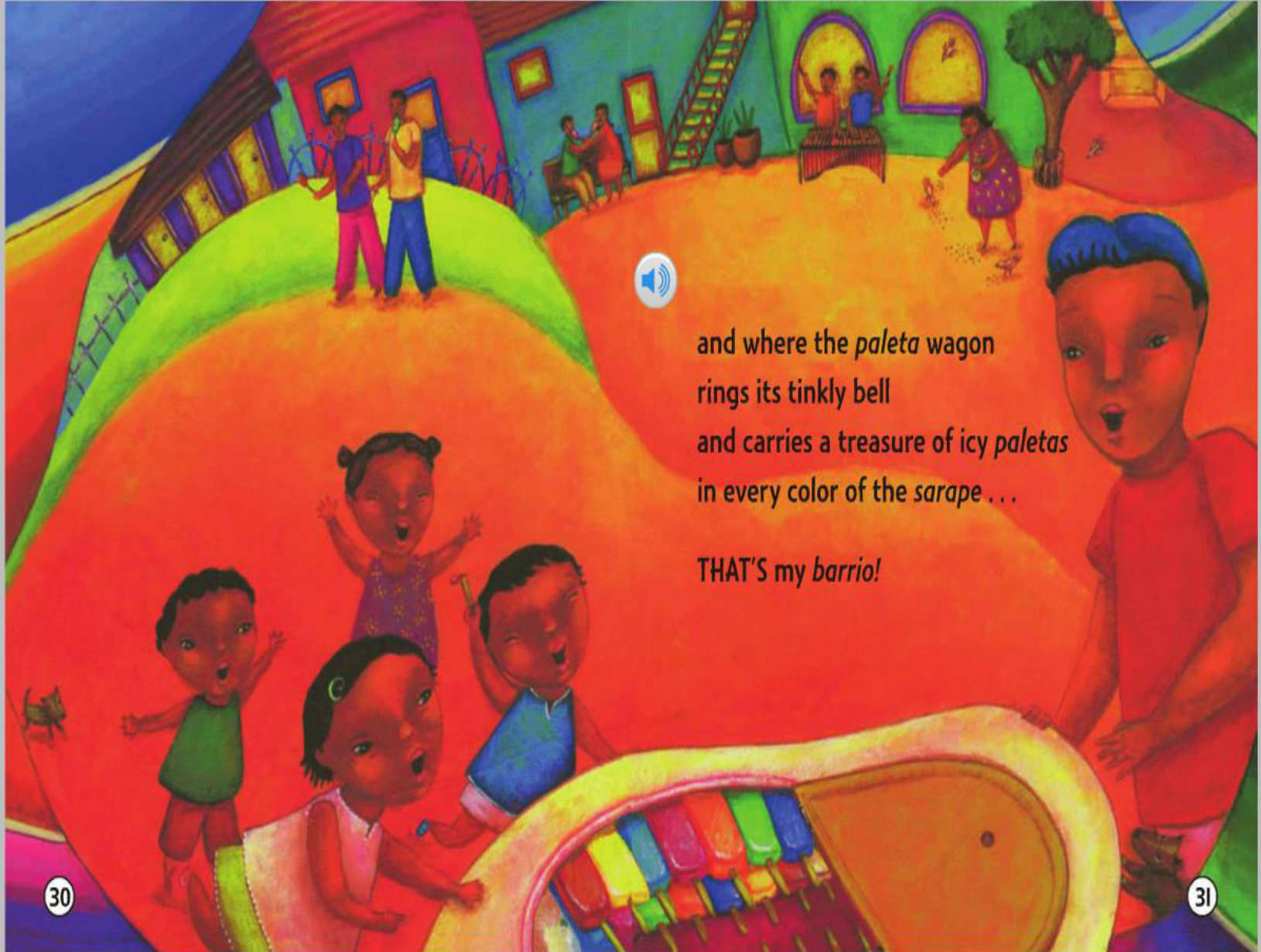
where the accordion plays sassy and sweet,

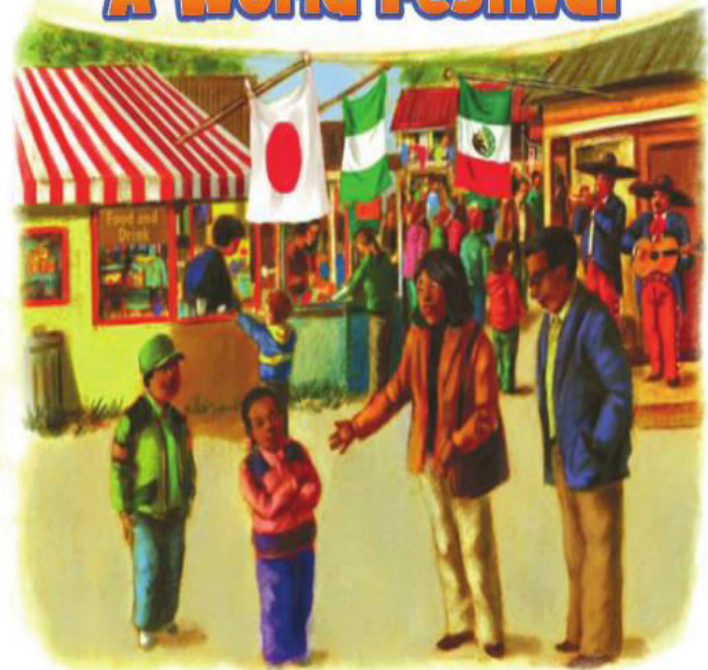

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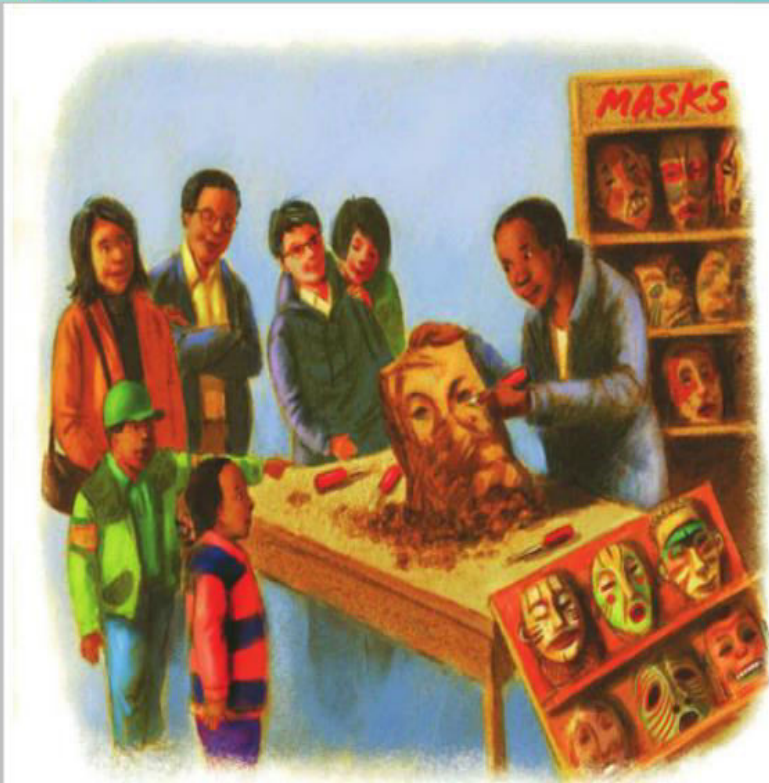
## A World Festival

"And crafts, shows, and music," says Dad.

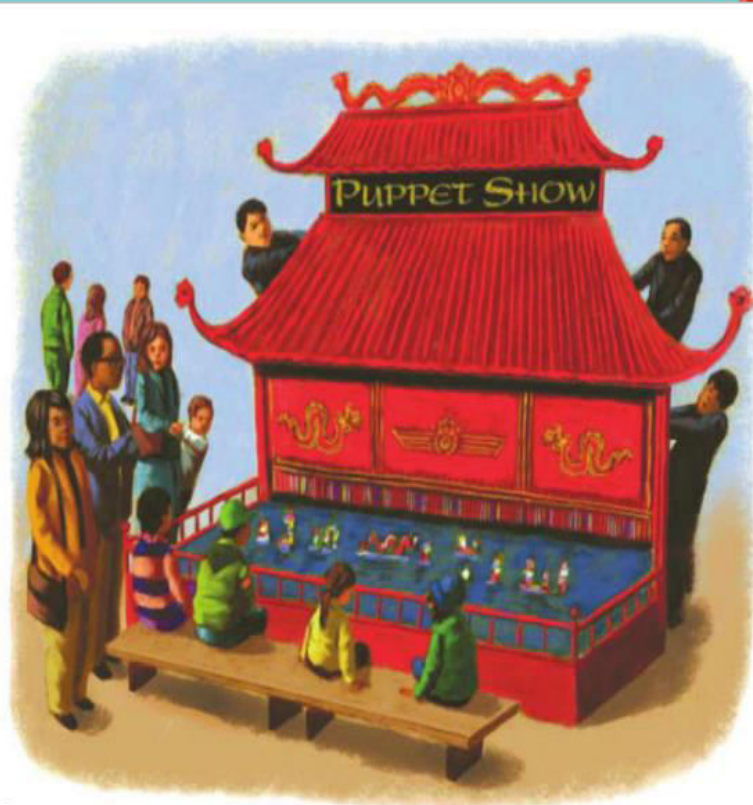
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Kyla stops to watch a sculptor from Africa.
